

### 12/5/24 GCICS Cultural Evening: Imagining the World in the Italian Renaissance



Centuries ago, Italian cartographers greatly influenced the perception of the world so that it led to many a voyage of discovery. We have a rare opportunity to gain experience more about their fascinating work when on **Thursday, December 5, 2024,** Prof. Carrie Beneš, who in March 2023 delighted us with a talk on the great Florentines during the Renaissance, will lead a panel of experts in the field.

Prof. Beneš describes this event thus: "This roundtable will engage the audience with the history of the Italian Renaissance by challenging received idea about the nature of maps and the history of European explorations. By exploring complexities of artistic representation, spatial projection, and map production, the presentation will broaden attendees' understanding of Renaissance culture and world history before the Age of Exploration, while also introducing them to some of the digital techniques scholars now use to study such maps."

The outstanding panel of presenters will include **Prof. Beneš** (New College of Florida), **Chet Van Duzer** (Rochester Institute of Technology), and **Jessica Maier** (Mount Holyoke College). Laura Morreale (Washington, DC) will moderate the event. Thumbnail bios of the panelists appear below. The event is organized under a New College Mellon Grant as part of the National Endowment for the Humanities' Scholarly Editions and Translations Program.

### **PANELISTS**

\*Carrie Beneš is a cultural historian of premodern Italy and the Mediterranean, focusing on the classical tradition, the cultural history of landscape and identity, and mapping/geospatial analysis. She is the author of *Urban Legends: Civic Identity and the Classical Past* (2011) as well as *A Companion to Medieval Genoa* (2018), and co-director of the La Sfera Project (sferaproject.org).

\*Chet Van Duzer is a widely published historian of cartography and one of the world's leading authorities on medieval and Renaissance maps. He is a board member of the Lazarus Project at the University of Rochester and a researcher-in-residence at the John Carter Brown Library at Brown University. He is the author of Sea Monsters on Medieval and Renaissance Maps (2013) as well as Henricus Martellus's World Map at Yale (c. 1491): Multispectral Imaging, Sources, and Influence (2019).

\*Jessica Maier is an art historian of European Renaissance art and architecture in a global context, focusing on traditionally overlooked categories of imagery such as prints, illustrated books, maps, and city views, which provide new insights into a period of extraordinary cultural activity. She is the author of *The Eternal City: A History of Rome in Maps* (2020) as well as *Rome Measured and Imagined: Early Modern Maps of the Eternal City* (2024).

\*Laura Morreale is a cultural historian of the late medieval Italian peninsula whose interests in French-language writing extend to the Latin East. She is the creator of several digital products such as the Oxford Outremer Map and the Harvard-based DALME Project (Documentary Archaeology of Late Medieval Europe) as well as one of Dr. Beneš's co-directors on the La Sfera Project. She is co-editor of the two-volume *Digital Medieval Studies-Practice and Preservation* (2022) and *Experimentation and Innovation* (2024).

### **BOB TATE**

Bob Tate, husband of Paola Nanni-Tate, died at Doctors Hospital, Sarasota on Wednesday October 23, 2024, of natural causes. Paola and his three children were all at his side. Bob and Paola were married for 60 years. They met in Ethiopia where Paola was born and they were married in Binghamton, New York on August 1st, 1964.

Bob graduated from Colgate University in 1959 with a Bachelor of Arts. He joined the Army, and was stationed in Asmara, Ethiopia in Army Intelligence where he met his future wife, Paola. He returned to the USA where he obtained a master's degree in counseling. He went to work at Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio as Assistant Placement Director of Recruiting.

Three years later he was hired by Dow Chemical in Human Resources and from there he went with Dow as Compensation Director to Horgen, Switzerland where the family resided for four years. They returned to Midland and, after 27 years with Dow, went to work at Drake Beam Morris in Outplacement. He worked there until his retirement.

Bob and Paola have three grown children, 8 grandchildren, and 6 great grandchildren spread across Italy, Michigan, and Florida. Bob was an avid tennis player, Rotarian, and skier, but he will be remembered as a great husband to Paola, father to his children and grandfather to all the grandchildren.

Leita Davis was recognized for her many contributions to citizens of the world, including the United States, Senegal, and Haiti.

In her outstanding years of service, Leita Davis was a trailblazer who engaged in efforts to foster peace and human rights through education, science, culture, and communication. She was an active feminist and a devoted humanitarian.

In conferring the award, GCICS President, Julie Bondarenko, drew attention to Leita's many worthwhile contributions to the Gulf Coast Community as well as the world at large. She pens book reviews for our newsletter and supports important causes such as F.E.L.T. (Feeding Empty Little Tummies).

Currently, she teaches for the Lifelong Learning Programs, lectures at International and GCICS conferences, and is serving as President of the Returned Peace Corps Volunteers of the Gulf Coast.

## INTRODUCTION: LEITA KALDI DAVIS "GCICS 2024 ITALIAN AMERICAN OF THE YEAR"

Free Spirit, Globe Trotter, Humanitarian These words aptly describe the person we are honoring today.

Leita Bevacqua has her roots in the region of Calabria in Southern Italy. Her father's parents immigrated to Fulton, NY, along the Oswego Canal that connects Lake Ontario and the Erie Canal. Leita was born and grew up in Fulton.

But by the age of twenty, Leita, a free spirit, was off to Paris, working for UNESCO as an Administrative Assistant. UNESCO is a United Nations agency that works to foster peace and human rights through education, science, culture, and communication. It was during her time in Paris that Leita first went exploring in Calabria to find her family. And finding them brought immense joy into her life.

From Paris, she worked for a wealthy American in Rome and spent time in Milan as well. But the United Nations was calling, so off she went to New York where she worked in the Office of Legal Affairs, handling protocol for foreign ministers who came to the UN to negotiate or sign treaties.

A job fascinated her in Boston, and so she found employment at Tufts and Harvard, working on programs that aided developing countries. Throughout these years, Leita took university courses in music, literature, and language. She became fluent in both French and Italian.

Leita had vacationed in Florida and decided to move to Miami in the 1980s. That move led to an adventure that shaped her life to this day. While working in Miami, a man came into the office and just happened to mention that he was joining the Peace Corps. Well, the 'free spirit' and 'globe trotter' that Leita was, she contacted the Peace Corps the following day. Two months later she was off to Senegal at the age of fifty-five as a Federal civil servant and member of the Peace Corps. To quote Leita, "I wanted to be on the ground."

And on the ground, she was for 3 years, living in a village in the bush close to the Gambia border. When asked about her work, she replied: "I invented my own work." She helped women with the set up and selling of food and crafts they made. She was involved with the building of an important warehouse; and she wrote grants to build school latrines.

Having been "on the ground" for 3 years, and due to health matters, she returned to the states for treatment at Georgetown University Hospital in Washington, DC, needing a year to recuperate.

Her next adventure was to Haiti in 1994 as an administrator at Albert Schweitzer Hospital founded by the Mellon family. She acquired that position due to a successful interview in which she brought a photo album of her Senegal experience. That certainly convinced the interviewer that Leita was serious about humanitarian service. The organization staffing that hospital was based in Sarasota. For the final 2 years of her 5-year assignment, she lived in the Meadows doing fundraising for the organization.

By 2002, Leita retired, remaining in Sarasota. She had been writing through the years. She penned her Senegal memoir, *Roller Skating in the Desert*, while living in Haiti. And upon

returning to FL after her Haiti assignment, she wrote her Haiti memoir, *In the Valley of Atibon*.

2007 was another turning point in her life. Leita met Bob Davis in a bar in Bradenton. By 2009 they married and settled in Bradenton. Leita continued to write and joined a number of lecture circuits. Bob and Leita made 2 International trips a year until the pandemic arrived.

Leita and Bob joined GCICS in 2013 and have been faithful members ever since. Leita has generously shared her expertise through GCICS cultural lectures and writing of a monthly book review column for our newsletter.

\*Since 1992, GCICS has had the privilege of honoring fifteen outstanding "Italian Americans of the Year." Our Society prides itself on recognizing a Gulf Coast resident who has made significant contributions to the welfare of Gulf Coast citizens as well as citizens beyond our Florida borders. That person must be of Italian American ancestry. This is a significant dimension of our Society's mission.

\*I am pleased to announce that the Board of Directors was unanimous in its selection of Leita Kaldi Davis, an 11-year member of GCICS, as our 2024recipient. It is an honor to share Leita's many contributions to our Gulf Coast community as well as to the world at large. In the bio that was read earlier, Leita was portrayed as a humanitarian and a public servant.

- \*Leita's public service and humanitarian work around the globe are reflected in:
- (1) Service in Paris, working for UNESCO.
- (2) Service as a Peace Corps volunteer in Senegal for 3 years, commencing at the age of fifty-five.
- (3) Service in Haiti at the Albert Schweitzer Hospital.
- (4) Receiving the Haitian Award in Miami for her support of human rights; and
- (5) Receiving from President Jimmy Carter the 2017 Lillian Carter Award, celebrating the extraordinary impact a Peace Corps volunteer over the age of 50 made somewhere around the globe.
- \*Leita's contributions in support of the Gulf Coast Communities include:
- (1) Serving as President of the Returned Peace Corps Volunteers of Gulf Coast, FL, for 7 years. In that capacity, she provided leadership to over two hundred retired Peace Corps volunteers in achieving their goals, one of which is "bringing the world home." The organization engages in

extensive community activities with a more recent example being the housing and support of 80 Afghan refugees who settled in the greater Bradenton area.

- (2) For 20 years, the book club in the organization: Through Women's Eyes, an all-volunteer non-profit women's rights and gender equity organization based in Sarasota.
- \*Leita's work as an author and lecturer include:
- (1) Writing memoirs on her life in Senegal and Haiti.
- (2) Writing memoirs on her Italian life notably "Dreams of Italy," "Milano to the Mezzogiorno," and "Circling Sicily," all available on Amazon.
- (3) Teaching courses in the Lifelong Learning Programs on the Gulf Coastwith topics such as: "500 Years of Italian Americans".
- (4) Lecturing at International Conferences on the topic of Roma Gypsies, whom she worked with for 15 years in the greater Boston area.
- (5) Lectures to our Italian Society on a wide variety of topics related to Italian history and culture.
- (6) And finally, writing reviews of fascinating books that focus on Italian life which appears in our monthly newsletters.
- \*These are highlights of Leita's extensive contributions to not only the Gulf Coast community but also to global communities. I know you will join me in a round of applause as we thank Leita for being such an inspirational human being in our world today. Leita, please join me at the podium for a presentation.
