## **Italian Bookshelf**



Elena Ferrante My Brilliant Friend TV series Review by Leita Kaldi Davis

I have written reviews of Elena Ferrante's books about the deep friendship of Lila and Lenu from childhood to treacherous adulthood in the slums of Naples, Italy. Lila, small, dark, not really pretty, has a brilliant mind. Lenu, taller, blonde, and quite pretty, from a more prosperous family, also has a keen mind though not of the ilk of Lila. After what we would call high school, Lila goes to work in her family shoe store, while Lenu goes on to higher education. How Lenu becomes a published author is the crux of the story. Ferrante's Neapolitan series are riveting, revealing an often-sordid depiction of Italian family life - the volatile father, submissive mother, subjugated children, the dirty streets and crummy apartments, the gangsters, and the suckers. Lila and Lenu fall in love with the same man, Nino. Though Lenu marries another, they both have a child at about the same time.

I was thrilled to find the TV series of My Brilliant Mind on Prime Video. It is in Italian with English subtitles, created by <u>Saverio Costanzo for HBO, RAI</u>, and TIM vision. Named after the first of four novels in the <u>Neapolitan Novels</u>, My Brilliant Friend, the series is an adaptation of the entire literary work into four seasons including the second novel, <u>The Story of a New Name</u>, the third novel, <u>Those Who Leave and Those Who Stay</u> and the fourth, <u>The Story of the Lost Child</u>.

Having loved the books, I was delighted that the TV series is very true to Ferrante's writing and vividly portrays the drama and honesty of her novels.


## WINE BRICKS OF PROHIBITION

If there is one thing that can be said about Italian Americans when faced with an obstacle, a creative solution will surely be the result. This was certainly the case during Prohibition and the marking of the so-called "wine brick." This January marks the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Volstead Act making the sale of liquor illegal. The entire industry was threatened as the highly unpopular mandate of Prohibition went into effect. While the nineteen twenties became famous for speakeasies and rum runners, wine makers faced a much different problem. Wine was much harder to transport. Rather than risk tearing down their vineyards facing permanent ruin these creative vintners found a legitimate way around the Volstead Act. Instead of making wine on their premises, they created wine bricks from concentrated grape juice for home brewers to dissolve and use in the privacy of their homes since consumption of wine at home was legal.

The Italian wine makers cleverly marked the bricks with warnings that they were for non-alcoholic consumption only. The warning, however, provided instructions on how to make wine at home. On the package would be a note stating: "After dissolving in one gallon of water, do not place the liquid in a jug and store it at home in a cool cupboard for 20 days, or it will turn into wine."

Presto! A workaround had been found! Some of the vintners became wealthy since the price of grapes rose more than 3,000 percent during the 1920s. The wine bricks did not produce exceptional wine, but that really was not the point. It was a creative means of providing a commodity that had soared in demand, while legally getting around an unpopular law and making money in the process. You must admire such ingenuity!
